I even got some hints of what was translated into German. "Better eating through chemistry" was a must for me (I've studied chemistry), unfortunately it had a fight with British customs who refused to release the tasting samples in time.

That was a bit the mantra of convention logistics: Many items promised are missing, like my panel speaker ribbon, the "no photography" button and, worst, the Andromeda Science Fiction Magazine special WorldCon issue with my article on German SF awards that I wanted to hand out during my panel. Darn British customs!

The lecture about the first German SF TV series Raumpatrouille Orion (prior to Star Trek!) was badly done - a real pity!

Therefore I fled to Kim Stanley Robinson - my best decision today! He was talking about time in novels - from Ulysses needing 800 pages for just 24 hours to Stapledon doing the universe in 200. Magnificent!
